The mission of the Core is to cultivate the skills, knowledge, and intellectual curiosity that are essential in every field of study, and which support a full and productive life. The Core provides the foundation to acquire a mastery of a particular field of study. No more than 7 hours of "D" will count in the LAC.

# --ESSENTIAL SKILLS (13 hours)--

By fulfilling the essential skills requirements, students will be able to think critically, write clearly and effectively, read with understanding and appreciation, speak effectively, demonstrate fundamental mathematical skills, and practice lifetime fitness skills.

## Freshman English/Writing (6 Hours)

Students with a score of 25 or higher on the English and Reading sections of the ACT (or equivalent test) will be awarded credit for ENG 1463 (Freshman English A) after completion of 15 hours at Henderson with a 2.00 or higher grade point average and ENG 1473 (Freshman English B) with a grade of "C" or better. Students must pass English courses with a "C" or better.

# Writing Intensive (WI) Requirement

While not a part of the Liberal Arts Core, each student must take one (1) additional 3000- or 4000-level writing intensive course in the major area of study. Approved courses are identified with "WI." Must pass with a "C" or better.

### ASSESSMENT-RELATED COURSES

Remediation courses should be completed during freshman year. Remediation courses do not count toward graduation hours, although they do count toward semester hours. All remedial work must be done before taking junior/senior courses. Math courses must be taken sequentially.

\*MTH 0003 is sufficient remediation for students wishing to take Mathematics for the Liberal Arts. Intermediate Algebra is the remediation course for College Algebra.

## **HONORS GUIDELINES**

Most entering honors-eligible students sign up for ENG 1803, English Honors (Substitutes for English B; must have ACT sub-scores of at least 25 in both English and Reading.)

Students who have satisfied the English B requirement should register for ENG 2793, Masters of Western Lit/Honors. [Students without AP Literature/Composition test score should sign up for English/Honors at a time matching Masters of Western Lit/Honors.]

Honors students should NOT take Philosophy, Civilization since 1660, Gen. Psychology, or Humanities Art, Music, Theatre in the first semester EXCEPT for those with 26 composite & who do not have 25 ACT in both Eng & Rdg.

## SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID (Contact office for more info) Academic Challenge Scholarship funded by the Lottery:

- First-time freshmen register for at least 12 hours in first fall; 15 hours every semester thereafter.
- At end of first spring, must have completed 27 hours with 2.5 GPA. (Recipients prior to Fall 2010: 30 hours/2.75 GPA)
- All remediation must be completed within first 30 attempted hours after receipt of scholarship.
- Deficient hours/GPA may be made up in summer at school of choice at own expense. Must have official transcript sent to ADHE.

## **Henderson Academic Scholarships:**

- MUST register for at least 15 hours at Henderson every fall and spring semester.
- Must complete 30 hours at HSU for the academic year AND meet minimum GPA for the scholarship. (Distinguished=3.25; Red & Gray Leadership=2.75; All others=3.0)
- Note: One-time probation is allowed to make up deficient hours or GPA (at own expense) at HSU during summer terms. Credit from other institutions cannot be used to make up deficiencies. If retention criteria are not met, there is no make-up option.

# **Henderson Performance Scholarships:**

- First-time freshmen register for at least 12 hours in first fall; 15 hours every semester thereafter.
- 2.5 GPA minimum (see Note above for making up deficiencies)

Henderson Athletic Scholarships: 12 hours per semester; min. GPA varies.
